Course Overview: Description, Objectives, and Resources

(3 credit hours) This course provides prospective secondary teachers with knowledge of theories and methods for implementing literacy instruction in content area classrooms. Reading assessments and literacy strategies that can be implemented with diverse learners are introduced and practiced.
